**AFFIDAVIT OF MRS JEAN TAMBURRINI**

At GLASGOW on the TWENTY THIRD day of JANUARY Two Thousand and Twelve, in the presence of LYNN FRASER, Solicitor and Notary Public, COMPEARED MRS JEAN TAMBURRINI residing at [REDACTED] who being solemnly sworn depones as follows:-

1. My date of birth is the [REDACTED]. I am the widow of the late Mr Victor Tamburrini who died on 17 November 2004.
2. I met Victor in 1987 and we moved in together in September 1988. We married in 1991.
3. My husband worked in the fruit market when I first met him. He worked up to six days per week. Sometimes he worked on a Saturday morning. During his spare time, we would go to our friends' houses or to the pub, or we would sit in together listening to music. We would drink alcohol, but we did not drink excessively. I would say that I had more of a social life than Victor did. I would often have nights out with my friends and he would stay at home.
4. In 1988 when we moved in together we would stay in most evenings as Victor was up so early. He started work at about 4.30 or 5.00am. He would often go to bed for a couple of hours before dinner. Because of the early starts he didn't drink during the week, except for if we were celebrating a birthday or a special occasion. We would go to the gym together during the week. Victor enjoyed the gym and being fit and active.
5. In about 1994, Victor was paid off from the fruit market and began working in a factory.

6. In around 1996, he began working in my brother in law, Benny Fisher's pub. He eventually became the manager of the bar.
7. Victor worked five nights a week in the bar and he would start at about 7pm and work until about 2 or 3am. He worked a mixture of weekdays and weekends. He drove to work. We would spend his nights off together at home or going to the gym. Sometimes he would have a couple of beers with his friends after the football but he didn't stay out late. He would come home and we would have a Chinese meal together.
8. We didn't have the money for Victor to drink heavily, especially when he was between jobs. We had our mortgage to pay.
9. We underwent three courses of IVF treatment in about 1996. Just before the treatment, we both abstained from alcohol to ensure that we were as healthy as possible and to give the treatment the maximum chance of success.
10. I do not recall my husband drinking anymore when he began working in the pub compared to when he worked in the fruit market. His habits remained the same. When I had a night out with my friends, he would stay at home.
11. My husband was very close to his family, including his nieces and nephews. He would pick them up and take them places, including driving them to relatives on Christmas day.
12. After Victor had his first transplant in October 2002, he knew that he had to abstain from alcohol. I remember saying to him that it wouldn't make much difference as he didn't drink much anyway. I know that he missed having a beer here and there after the football and missed the social aspect of drinking.

However, a few months after his transplant I remember him pouring a glass of wine and he didn't drink it as he couldn't face it. I remember drinking champagne at our anniversary dinner in March 2003 and that Victor didn't have any of it.

Victor's family are incredulous about the reference to him drinking 50 to 100 units in the medical records and, when they heard about this entry they asked if it related to the right Victor Tamburrini. I am aware of how much alcohol that number of units involves and I am clear that he did not drink that amount in any week in the time that I knew him.
